Michael's Musings

"We do not gather at Easter to celebrate a doctrine. We come here to rejoice in the presence of one we love; in Jesus who was lost to us and has been found." So says Herbert McCabe, writing in "A Sermon for Easter" (God Still Matters).

Indeed, we gather to worship at Easter to share in the most profound transforming experience of our lives: The crucified one is now alive among us. As Pope John Paul II put it, "It is impossible for us (Christians) to abandon ourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and hallelujah is our song!"

But it can be hard to sing, "hallelujah" when, if the truth be told, the resurrection we are really focused on is our lost Christian privilege. Somewhere along the line we Christians replaced the experience of the Resurrected Christ among us with what I believe is now a particularly dangerous conviction: that God intended Christianity to be THE ONLY religion of the world. Thus, rather than being an attractive people of joy due to our experience of the Living Christ, we settle for being a people of subdued optimism due to our religious convictions.

Blaise Pascal once wrote, "Human beings never do evil so cheerfully as when they do it from religious conviction." Indeed, religious conviction without the experience of the Resurrected One blocks our capacity for self-criticism, destroys humility, and undermines the sense of oneness that should bind us together as one – not just with other Christians of conviction – but with all of humanity. It was religious conviction (divorced from the experience of the risen Christ) that inspired the Christian Crusades against Muslims and, centuries later, the Easter pogroms of Eastern Europe that led to the slaughter of Jews.

Here, I can't help but recall a William Sloan Coffin quote that I think about often: "I have become convinced that the more important question is not, 'Who believes in God?', but 'In whom does God believe?' Rather than claim God for our side, it's better to wonder whether we are on God's side." William Sloane Coffin, Letters to a Young Doubter (Westminster John Knox, 2005), 22-24.

As faithful disciples of Jesus we proclaim at Easter that this "wonder as doubt" has been transformed into "wonder as awe" by way of the experience of the resurrected, crucified Christ we experience together in community. What could be more inviting that that?!



Spring is here, and the beauty of God's creation is all around us. As we celebrate the season of Easter we look forward to the changes that the new year promises.

We have strived to continue the music ministry here at Trinity, and I remain in awe of the dedication and talent of our scholarship singers as well as Carol Virkler and Bill Daley. We also have welcomed Christine Nichols as the choir accompanist.

As we have done for the past few years we will be **presenting** a Maundy Thursday service. This year's presentation we will be TENEBRAE, JESUS LIGHT OF THE WORLD. I hope that each of you will join us on Facebook Live at 7:00 pm on April 1, and invite your friends and family to join.

Easter Sunday we have some very special musical offerings. In addition to our regular musicians we will be supported by our woodwind trio and a small brass section. I hope that next year we will all be worshiping together safely in God's house.

Report from Ad Hoc Committee on Preparation for Return to In-Person Worship

In many ways, online worship over the last year has been the glue that has held us all together. Can you imagine what the pandemic would have been like without it? The dedication of our pastor, musicians and technological crew have been such a blessing! The Worship Committee, aware of how accustomed we have all become to the excellence of our online worship, know how important it will be, even after we return to in-person worship to continue that excellence. However, they do not want the in-person worship to suffer as a result. To that end, at the beginning of February, with the blessing of the session, they appointed a group of people to implement a plan for post-pandemic worship. They are Ted Groshong, Chair, Michael Fues, Rob Humfeld, Bill Kennedy, Fran Muench, Odell Newkirk, and Steve Yates. Elinor Arendt and Norm Gysbers are ex-officio members from the Property Committee. Michael Stanfield and Ann Bouchard are ex-officio members as staff persons. This group has met numerous times and received the advice of several consultants regarding how best to make the transition back to in-person worship.

Pandemic worship has changed the meaning of membership. Since people were forced to worship online, churches, like Trinity, who did it well, attracted regular worshippers from all around the country. We don't want to lose them. But neither do we want people who begin attending in person to have a second-rate experience. Thus, the ad hoc committee, again with the session's blessing, decided to move forward with adding screens in the sanctuary. After several meetings in the sanctuary with Ryan Mays, whose company, Mays Communications, has provided us with excellent work in the past, Ryan presented the committee with several alternative plans ranging in price from around \$18,000 to around \$25,000. With the idea that we have a building fund and other sources from which we could take the funds, the session approved the project. However, rather than depleting those funds that may be needed later for other required maintenance, the session would prefer that we fund the project by way of the congregation, if we can. As of this writing, even before announcing this project church wide, \$11,000 has already been donated to be used for needed technology in worship – including a donation from a nonmember from another state who watches us every week online! If you are interested in giving towards the project, simply mail a check to Trinity with "worship technology" in the memo line. Many thanks from the session and the ad hoc worship group!

Funds have recently been used to assist two Columbia residents with utility bills, to enable a newly employed individual to purchase tools needed for his work, and to purchase groceries for another individual.



Highlights from the March Session Meeting

- ◆Continued the suspension of in-person worship through the end of May;
- ◆Approved a new vacation/sick leave policy for the Administrative Assistant position;
- ◆Endorsed Rev. Stanfield's request for a 3-month sabbatical end of May—end of August, 2022; (The sabbatical after 7 years of service was included in his terms of call when he came to Trinity in 2015.)
- Approved a donation from the February 15th Fund of \$500 to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for Texas Winter Storm relief;
- ◆Gave permission to Boy Scout Troop 4 to use four classrooms on the lower level for patrol meetings (masks and social distancing, required);
- Approved the use of the sanctuary for the senior voice recital of one of pianist Christine Nichols' students on May 24; and
- Approved funding for television monitors which will be installed in the sanctuary for use when inperson worship services begin again. (See additional information about this project on page 3.)



Food For Thought

Awe

Whenever I lapse into Pride, something is sure to come along that reveals the Awe shown by others long past. This happened to me this week when a story in *The* New York Times reported on a wooden Shigir Idol that was found deep in a peat bog in Russia. The 17-foot object, carved from a log of larch, dates to about 12,000 years ago. Its cut faces and patterned markings are evidence of purposeful representation of 'something' or 'someone' and are extraordinary for such early human activities. Our Pride ignores the "Primitive" the Neanderthal, the "Cave Dweller" and their Awe with sunrise, equinox, moons, and every other experience, and how they assigned patterns ("science") to them. Examples include the development and worldwide dispersion of agricultural practices from around 12,000 years ago; Mayan structures 9,000 years ago; the Great Pyramids (4,600 years ago), and Stonehenge and its predecessors (5,400 years ago). New revelations on their origins and purposes are discovered all the time.
